At all of these venues.

they have received accolades testifying to the quality and deep spirituality of their music and singing.

Gerre Hancock, organist and choirmaster of St Thomas Church, New York City, said of them: "They are, in short, superb. Their singing comes from the heart and the listener is inevitably moved very deaply."

Glaswegians will get a chance to share this transcendental experience when the 44-strong choir, under the inspired leadership of Elizabeth C. Patterson, sings at the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama on September 14.

They will also participate in an ecumenical service at Glaegow Cathedral at 3pm on Sunday, September 15.

• Gloria Del Cantores are at the RSAMD on Sept 14, and Glaegow Cathedral on Sept 15.

ASGOW is one of the citles chosen by the professionally trained American choir Gioriae Del Cantores for a concert in its international Gateway series this month. The series is also taking them to Holland, Italy and Poland.

Although the singers specialise in Gregorian chant, their repartoire spans all historical periods from the 11th century to the 20th, and includes some of the finest sacred music by British, American, European and Russian composers.

Glorige Del Cantores, founded in 1975, is "dedicated to dissolving bar-

ing of two half-hour worship services, to be shown in December. BBC Radio 3 has invited the choir to record a programme of American music for transmission in November.

The Glasgow concert will be held in the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama on September 14 at 7.30pm.

The choir is also taking part in an ecumenical service in Glasgow Cathedral the next day. Hosted by the St Mungo Singers, and starting at opm, the service will be attended by 500 of the city's choristers,

Scottish Television broadcast on Easter Sunday a documentary about the choir's recent tour of the Soviet Union and Czechoslovakia, and plans are under way for the recordchurch and civic leaders.

Regretfully, I will have to pass up this chance to listen to these singers. Judging them from a tape I received I suspect I'm missing a tremendous experience.

They produce a very clean, rich, beautifully controlled sound, and sing with inspiring conviction. If you can get to hear them in Glasgow, I am sure you will not be disappointed.

American visiting choir launches massive concert

GLASGOW has surprised itself by coming up with perhaps the biggest impromptu choral festival in the world.

What began as a throw away "Why don't we get together for a sing-song" has brought an amazing 500 city choristers together.

The reason for this mega production is the arrival in the city of the world famous American choir, Gloriae Dei Cantores.

It is the first time this highly acclaimed travelling choir has visited Scotland.

In recent months the ecumenical singers have been caught up in a rigourous sour of eastern European countries, bringing together Christians of all denominations.

In fact improving interdenominational understanding is their entire raison d'erre.

Gloriae Dei Cantores were scheduled to perform one concert at the Royal Academy of Music and Drama and record a one hour programme for Scottish Television.

But the members of the choir expressed a desire to meet with choristers from churches in Glasgow. Enter stage left the idea for a sing-along.

Fr. Gerry Fitzpatrick and John Rafferty, Chief Executive of the Scottish Foundation, wrote to panish choirs with the intention of a small performance in Glasgow Cathedral.

Such was the response - 500 said they wanted to join in that the event has had to be moved from the original venue of Glasgow Cathedral to St. Coumba's Free Church in St. Vincent Street, the biggest church in the inner city.

As well as the 500 choristers from Glasgow and 60 members

of Gloriae Dei Cantores, there will be 120 invited guests at the 3 pm start of the September 15 event.

There were also 300 places set aside for members of the public and tickets for this unique ecumenical event. Tickets are still available from John Rafferty at the Scottish Foundation, 25/27 Elmbank Street, Glasgow. Tel 041-226 3431.

Among the special guests attending the choral service will be the Lord Provest of Glasgow, Mirs Susan Baird.

She has invited all the pericipating charisters back to the City Chambers for a special reception to mark the occasion.
